A church that is filled with Easter people will be a church of encouragement, strength, openness, affirmation, and growth. An Easter people congregation is a community where Jesus is followed, God is worshipped, and the good news is for everyone.

Please sign up on the bulletin board if you'd like to help plan the meal. We also need men to sign up to help serve and clean up. You'll have lots of fun and lots of good food.




## Book Discussion Group

## Open and Affirming


The ONA committee has been meeting regularly for several months. We have been pleased with the feedback after the two showings of the movie "For the Bible Tells Me So" and from many individuals. Two questions in particular have arisen frequently. I would like to take this opportunity to answer them.

First, what is Open and Affirming (ONA)? This is a way in which UCC churches may declare that they welcome all persons into the full life and ministry of the church. This includes a specific welcome to people of all sexual orientations.

Zion prides itself on being a welcoming church. Many Zion members feel we are already ONA. This brings me to the second question--if we already welcome everyone, why do we need to make a specific public statement? Every church says it welcomes everyone. Unfortunately, too many lesbian/gay/bisexual and transgendered people and their families live with the painful reality that "everyone" doesn't include them. This is also true for persons with disabilities, single parent families or people of differing racial and ethnic origin than the congregation. An open and affirming statement clarifies who is included in "everyone." It proclaims God's love is for people of every color, age, ethnicity, gender, sexual orientation, economic status or ability. An open and affirming statement is a covenant that all are created by God, loved by God, and blessed by God; and therefore, welcome to full participation in Zion church.

In closing, the ONA committee invites your continued participation in our journey. Please inform us if you feel you need more information or if you feel we haven't presented something you would like to have addressed. ## The LaPoint Bequest

Frank and Laura LaPoint were not blessed with children, but they nevertheless had a loving family and a close church community in Zion UCC. Martha Landstrom, who knew Frank and Laura, describes them as "nice, good people" who treasured their privacy but liked to help people.

So when Laura LaPoint sat down with her attorney to plan her estate arrangements, she had many things in mind. Naturally, her family was her highest priority. But she also remembered Zion United Church of Christ.

Using a trust mechanism, Laura first took care of her family, providing that they would first receive the income from the trust. But then she remembered other people who had been important in her life, including Zion UCC. Laura provided that after her family had been taken care of, others, like Zion, would also be taken care of.

So she provided that Zion would receive a share of what remained. This month Zion will receive from the LaPoint Trust approximately \$28,000 in unrestricted funds.

Laura LaPoint's example is important for two reasons. First, and most obvious, the LaPoint bequest provides the church with funds that are needed for the operation of the church. While the church has been generously supportive though recent successful stewardship campaigns, the church budget is always under pressure. These funds will ease some of that pressure.

Second, the unrestricted nature of the bequest is an expression of confidence in Zion to use the funds in the best interests of the church. Laura LaPoint did not try to erect monuments to herself nor did she try to control how the funds would be spent. She recognized that she could not know or anticipate what Zion's needs might be when her trust terminated and the funds reached Zion. She had confidence that when that day came the church would know how best to use the bequest.

Laura LaPoint is an example of effective estate planning to achieve multiple objectives: taking care of family and remembering her church. These are not mutually exclusive goals. If 75 church members, after taking care of their family's needs, left the church the same \$28,000 as did Laura LaPoint, Zion could eventually receive more than \$2 million in unrestricted gifts to expand the Endowment ("the gift that keeps on giving") and to support special needs of the Church.

It's something to think about.

## A New Way is Possible

The prison of Basse-Terre has been making the French news lately, unfortunately, for the wrong reasons. It was ranked the worst prison of France. Tim Rose, Global Ministries missionary in Guadeloupe says, I am assigned as both prison chaplain and "reinsertion" counselor at the prison of Basse-Terre.

Originally built in 1660, as a catholic convent, it was converted into a prison in 1772. Not only is the prison old and rundown, the prison is extremely overcrowded. Set up to hold 130 prisoners its current population is approximately 200 and there are only two social workers assigned to work with the prisoners.

The Protestant Reformed Church of Guadeloupe (PRCG) has a prison chaplaincy program and a partnership with a local non-profit organization, "Accolade Caraibes," to maintain a presence in the prison. I accompany the prisoners spiritually, and I help them make plans to re-enter society after their release. Through job training, spiritual support, family counseling, transitional housing opportunities and acting as a link between the prisoners and the parole board, I try to help prisoners create a new life for themselves.

Obviously the challenges are immense. Through listening, prayer and helping prisoners find real solutions to their problems, many have come to realize that God's promise of new life is possible.

Please pray for the prison population of Guadeloupe and the work of the Prison Chaplains and the social workers of Accolade Caraibes.
