Is it possible the Catholic's have a pope I can like? Even possibly admire or emulate? John XXIII who convened the Second Vatican Council was the only other pope I thought I could ever love. But now there is this new pope who acts more like the Vicar of Christ. No more red shoes. Gone is the pope mobile. (he insists on driving his own small car), he hasn't

moved into the papal apartments but keeps his own small living space. But it isn't just material possessions about which this pope is humble. He also seems to have a personality of humility warding off the "pope groupies" that are gathering in his home city of Rio de Janeiro. Pope Francis supposedly abhors the statue of himself and demanded that it be taken down (of course, if you've seen the statue, it looks pretty awful). The pope also told the bishops that they had "better look out for their flocks and put an end to the 'clerical' culture that places priests on pedestals."

Pope Francis is unassuming and he is non-materialistic. But most importantly, he actually uses the language of Jesus. Francis talks of social justice, equal rights, and an end to poverty. Only this morning, he said: "If someone is gay and he searches for the Lord and has good will, who am I to judge?" Is he all talk and no action? I don't know yet, but it looks hopeful. And hopeful isn't a word I generally use when I describe the Vatican.

Even so, this pope is not perfect—infallibility doctrine aside. He has declared the issue of women priests "closed." As much as I try, I just cannot figure out why the pope and the Vatican are so weird about women. I suppose the Vatican is a deeply political institution sustained by its own maintenance of power and even a really cool new pope doesn't have the courage to challenge that. Too bad; the greatest voices of

Christianity have been those unafraid to stand up and speak out. Pope Francis seems like he might be one of those voices. Let's hope so.

So why spend so much time discussing my observations of the pope? Because our actions and our speech are also observed by people who will make decisions based on what they see about Zion UCC. A few Sundays ago, we had two visitors from northwest Iowa. When I asked what brought them to Burlington that morning assuming that they had friends or family in town, their answer surprised me. They said they had heard about our rainbow banner and had driven here just to worship at Zion. A week later I received a thank you note from them saying that they felt at home when they worshipped with us. Our rainbow banner is bigger than we think it is. A young woman sat in my office in tears telling me about losing her job and facing eviction. I asked her how she knew about Bridging the Gap. She said a friend in another town told her Zion is the helping church. Our outreach to low-income people is bigger than we think it is. A member of the Burlington community began worshipping at Zion recently and later said to me, "I think I may have finally found the church that lets me believe in God my own way." Our theology of acceptance is bigger than we think it is.

Just like a pope who realizes that the world is bigger than bishops in long red robes, ours is a world that includes everyone. Zion is a church answering the many needs of God's people. We are not just the gay pride church, or the church that helps the poor, or the church that practices an accepting the journey of faith. We are more. As Zion continues to reach further out into the world it will continue to be a church of many things to many people. We are bigger than we think we are!

Fall Adult Sunday School Summer-Fall Reading List

In November, Adult Sunday School will consider "Racism and National Security" in the context of the internment of Japanese Americans during World War II. The summer-fall reading list for this topic is:

- A Farewell to Manzanar by Jeanne
 Wakatsuki Houston "is the true story of
 one spirited Japanese American family's
 attempt to survive the indignities of forced
 detention...and of a native-born American
 child who discovered what it was like to
 grow up behind barbed wire in the United
 States." [dust jacket copy]
- Snow Falling on Cedars by David Guterson. "San Piedro Island, north of Puget Sound, is a place so isolated that no one who lives there can afford to make enemies. But in 1954 a local fisherman is found suspiciously drowned, and a Japanese American named Kabuo is charged with his murder. In the course of the ensuing trial, it becomes clear that what is at stake is more than one man's guilt. For on San Piedro, memory grows as thickly as cedar trees and the fields of ripe strawberries-memories of a charmed love affair between a white boy and the Japanese girl who grew up to become Kabuo's wife; memories of land desired, paid for, and lost. Above all, San Piedro is haunted by the memory of what happened to its Japanese residents during World War II, when an entire community was sent into exile while its neighbors watched." [dust jacket copy]
- Hotel on the Corner of Bitter and Sweet by Jamie Ford explores the experience of Japanese Americans in the Seattle area during World War II in the context of a love story between a Chinese boy and a Japanese American girl who was sent to the Minidoka camp in Idaho.

Prayers and Efforts for Peace Prevail

Opon returning to Colombia in July, I was asked to begin working full-time with the Council of Evangelical Churches (CEDECOL)

Peace Commission's Prophetic Call human rights documentation program. Our goals continue to be to document the impact of the armed conflict on Protestant and evangelical churches in Colombia,

to provide material, spiritual and legal support to the victims and to advocate for governmental policies - both in Colombia and from the US - that support victims and bring an end to the armed conflict. We recently published the Prophetic Call annual report with cases from 2010 and 2011 in both Spanish and English. These reports bear witness to the hundreds of human rights violations suffered by members of our churches as well as the positive responses to the conflict from our churches. We continue to accompany the farming communities of El Garzal, Las Pavas and a group of 12 farming communities in southern Córdoba Province all of whom face violence in their struggle to keep the land they depend on for survival. We celebrate with the communities of El Garzal and Las Pavas recent decisions from the Colombian Rural Development Institute (INCODER) in favor of the peasants' ownership of the land.


The biggest new development in Colombia is the beginning of formal negotiations in Havana, between the FARC guerrilla and the Colombian government seeking to end their armed conflict. This new scenario for peace has invigorated peace building networks throughout Colombia.

God, we pray for the peoples of Colombia, especially those who are being terrorized and abused. We ask for a positive outcome to the negotiations to end the armed conflict, and we celebrate the support of the four official partnerships with US churches. We ask for continued strength and renewed hope for the staff of CEDECOL who so arduously work for peace.
