The gun went off and the crowd of runners, many in bright green shirts, surged forward. I was planning on walking the 5K but caught up in the spirit of the moment, I began to run. I hadn't run in almost two years so I just assumed I would jog for a few minutes and then walk the rest. However, I soon fell in step with a good friend and she encouraged me to keep running.

The disciples must have felt lost when Jesus was no longer with them. As long as he was around, they had his encouragement and love. Then he was gone and although there was promise of his return, the weeks and months went by. The disciples had started off running the race, but perhaps they began to think, "well, if he doesn't return soon, we'll just walk." Or maybe they even had thoughts of quitting all together.

When the social justice committee decided to sponsor "Zion Runs for the Homeless", we were all quietly skeptical. We committed to it, but I know that more than one of us wondered "can we really do this?"

I crossed the one mile mark and found I was still running. I felt elated that I was running with no pain in my "bad" knee and still some significant oxygen reserves seemingly left in my lungs, but at 1.5 miles I wanted to walk. "You can do it," my friend said moving with ease nearly gliding along the sidewalk. I tried to ignore the fact that she was in extremely good shape, ten years younger, and 30 pounds lighter. I kept running.

The disciples kept running and no doubt they wanted to quit. They ran through the sadness of Jesus' death, the euphoria of Pentecost, the conflicts between Paul and Peter, and repeated setbacks. I wonder how they did it? Probably the same way my friend and I did it. They laughed and talked and encouraged their way through.

The night before the race, the members of the social justice committee wondered if we were really ready. Everyone had a job to do and standing around nervously after

our carb-loading dinner, we reviewed each aspect of the race. We reminded each other that we needed to be back at the church at 6:30 AM and said good night. I barely slept that night.

Suddenly, I saw it: Snake Alley. I had done it-- after two years of not running, I completed a 5K. My friend took off down the winding brick path while I followed more slowly. I knew that if I had run alone, I would have stopped and walked, but with a friend I was able to do what I had thought impossible.

The race was a huge success. 71 runners and \$2600.00 raised for the homeless shelter. More than 50 church members came together to make it happen. We worked together-- encouraging, talking, joking, planning, giving. It was truly a whole church effort.

Remember the word of Ecclesiastes 4:9-12

"Two are better than one,

because they have a good return for their work:

If one falls down,

his friend can help him up.

But pity the one who falls

and has no one to help them up!

Also, if two lie down together, they will keep warm.

But how can one keep warm alone?

Though one may be overpowered,

two can defend themselves."

No one makes it alone. Not the Early Church, not today's Church. Running the race by yourself is just no fun.


CHURCH SCHOOL NEWS

Fall Adult Sunday School Summer-Fall Reading List

In November, Adult Sunday School will consider "Racism and National Security" in the context of the internment of Japanese Americans during World War II. The summer-fall reading list for this topic is:

- A Farewell to Manzanar by Jeanne
 Wakatsuki Houston "is the true story of
 one spirited Japanese American family's
 attempt to survive the indignities of forced
 detention...and of a native-born American
 child who discovered what it was like to
 grow up behind barbed wire in the United
 States." [dust jacket copy]
- Snow Falling on Cedars by David Guterson. "San Piedro Island, north of Puget Sound, is a place so isolated that no one who lives there can afford to make enemies. But in 1954 a local fisherman is found suspiciously drowned, and a Japanese American named Kabuo is charged with his murder. In the course of the ensuing trial, it becomes clear that what is at stake is more than one man's guilt. For on San Piedro, memory grows as thickly as cedar trees and the fields of ripe strawberries-memories of a charmed love affair between a white boy and the Japanese girl who grew up to become Kabuo's wife; memories of land desired, paid for, and lost. Above all, San Piedro is haunted by the memory of what happened to its Japanese residents during World War II, when an entire community was sent into exile while its neighbors watched." [dust jacket copy]
- Hotel on the Corner of Bitter and Sweet by Jamie Ford explores the experience of Japanese Americans in the Seattle area during World War II in the context of a love story between a Chinese boy and a Japanese American girl who was sent to the Minidoka camp in Idaho.

Team UCC will be joined by First Christian Church this year for painting our assigned house. The address is 827 N. 10th Street, and a couple pictures of it are on the bulletin board.


No work will be done on the house on Tuesday, September 3rd.

Blood donation is a safe, simple procedure that takes about 45 minutes to one hour. Individuals with diabetes or controlled high blood pressure may be accepted as eligible donors. Thank you!

Hearts Breaking, Minds Hearing

II recently accompanied a group visiting from the Mississippi Boulevard Christian Church in Tennessee. It immediately seemed to me that they were a glowing and warm group. Because of that **GLORIA** I believe we walked together during the entire week witnessing, VICENTE CANÚ breathing, smelling, feeling and touching the air, spaces and people that surrounded us. As we walked together in various settings, I saw myself differently than before. I was not only a woman representing the church as a missionary of color, but as a mother, as a Maya, as a member of a colonized people and an interpreter of the language and culture. As I processed the visit, I saw what my brothers and sisters meant when they said, "You got a full load". But more important was the love I received from their visit. My role is to accompany visiting church delegations so they may open their eyes and have their hearts broken in such a way that together we may learn about the social reality of a colonized and oppressed people. And from that realization, we must also learn to ask questions, as individuals and as churches, about whether or not we are following Jesus' example of love, justice and compassion with and among our brothers and sisters in Christ, abroad and at home. One lesson learned which impacted all of us who were present is found in the words of Presbyterian pastor Osmundo who said, "We are not investing in building churches but rather investing in building people." What an opportune time to hear these words because they came at a "breaking point," a point in which our hearts needed to feel and our minds needed to hear. Despite all of my feelings and my "full load", I know that it is through this love that I too receive. That will enable me to continue to be resilient despite the social conflict and continuing repression in Guatemala.

"God of justice, free us from the tyranny of false choices. Grant us wisdom to integrate our thoughts, feelings and actions so that we may be integrated agents of transformation. Amen." Dwight Lee Wolter

Gloria Vicente Canú is serving a three-year term with the Ecumenical Christian Council of Guatemala (Consejo Ecuménico Cristiano de Guatemala – CECG), as a consultant for communication, interpretation and women's projects.
