"Preparing for New Life"

One of the key Bible verses we encounter during the season of Lent is from John's Gospel. "For God did not send the Son into the world to condemn the world, but so that the world might be saved."

Jesus claims for himself that his mission from God is to rescue the whole of creation. Toward that end, he hangs out with the outcasts, the vulnerable, and the unlovely. There is room in his embrace for all of creation. Even for us. Even for you and me; as ragged and cracked and frustrated as we are. We are priceless to God. Having learned that we are wanted, Lent offers us a chance to prepare.

On Wednesday, March 5, our season of preparation for the Resurrection begins. Wednesday, March 5 begins the season of Lent with Ash Wednesday. Lent is a season of getting ready. Of clearing away what has become stagnant and stale and routine in our lives; preparing our spiritual selves for new life.

For almost two millennia, the Church has begun this season of preparation by reminding us to realign our priorities. A bold touch of ashes on the forehead reminds us that even in the midst of life, the end of this life is never far away. We are reminded of a more important priority: life eternal.

Some face this time of preparation with dread - trying to avoid thought and self-examination—misunderstanding Lent as being about giving up things. Instead, Lent is about taking on more important pursuits, sorting out what is most important and giving ourselves permission to drop whatever might have become a focus.

Lent is not about making yourself miserable by giving up anything you might enjoy. Lent is about clearing the decks, getting spiritually ready for the Resurrection; straightening up the clutter, organizing our priorities, and receiving permission to jettison anything that interferes with the growth and health of your own faith in God.

What if we gave ourselves permission to get rid of anything that is dragging us down? Sweep out the negative self-talk, dump the simmering anger over past hurts, prune away any habits that have grown to create distance between ourselves and God.

And in that newly swept, newly opened ground, we can take on more time for prayer, quiet meditation, time spent reading the Bible. With that new cleared space, we can spend some of our energy lifting up others, encouraging those around us, offering the love of Christ to someone who has never heard his Good News.




Adult Sunday School



Bridging the Gap

"I have come that they may have and have it abundantly."

God's World of Abundance

A shoe company sends two traveling sales people into a new territory, deep in the Ozark Mountains. After thirty days, one of the sales people

shows up at the home office, dumps his sample case on the floor and says, "I quit! Not a single one of those people in my territory ever wears shoes! This is impossible." And off he stomps, destroyed by the scarcity of his territory.

No one in the home office hears a word from the second sales person for thirty days, forty-five days. Finally, after two months, the second sales person shows up in the home office.

"Wow!" he says, "This is the best territory that has ever been! No one here has shoes. Every person in my territory is a customer!" Practically dancing with joy, he celebrates the overflowing abundance.

A soft drink bottling company sells out every bottle it produces, and makes a profit on every bottle it sells.

But somehow fear is instilled in the leaders. Perhaps there will be a scarcity of soft drinkers next year, and since they are such a small producer, they are more vulnerable than the better known giants. There might not be enough business to go around. Acting out of a fear of scarcity, production is scaled back, long-time employees are forced into retirement, distribution networks are abandoned.

Their fear of scarcity becomes a self-fulfilling prophecy. Fewer bottles produced, fewer retail outlets serviced, fewer experienced employees leads to fewer sales, which leads to an economic scarcity. No profits made on falling sales accelerates the decline of a once solid company. Until scarcity destroys their business.

Cob webs on the closed factory door whisper, "Scarcity said it would be like this."

Ice-water fear flows down the back of the neck, freezing us in place, causing us to instinctively pull back, withhold, hoard precious resources in short supply.

Side by side, one of us will live in a world of scarcity--paralyzed by the fear that there will never be enough. The other basks in a world of abundance, celebrating the love which God pours out upon all creation. There is plenty and enough to share, because God has made an abundant world for us to enjoy.

The spiritual discipline of Stewardship is the process of recognizing the truth that God has made for us a world of overflowing abundance, cultivating faith enough to receive it and to share the abundance with others. Stewardship means repudiating the lie that the world is a place of scarcity, where we must hoard all we can for ourselves because there is not enough to share with others. The more we learn the lessons of God's abundance, the more generous we are in sharing what we have for the sake of ministering to others, and the more abundance we see from God's grace toward all.

Jesus said he came so that "we might have life, and have it abundantly." [John 10:10]

"Bring the full tithe into the storehouse, so that there may be food in my house, and thus put me to the test, says the LORD of hosts; see if I will not open the windows of heaven for you and pour down for you an overflowing blessing.... Then all nations will count you blessed, for you will be a land of delight, says the LORD of hosts." [Malachi 3:10,12]






