Living with the Questions

Zion Church is full of the most amazing people! I am routinely amazed by their passion for the vulnerable, their extravagant generosity of their time and treasure, and by their love for the Gospel lived out in love for their neighbors.

Some of my favorite people here describe themselves as being in "Recovery" from one or another religious tradition which left them feeling wounded and shamed rather than confident of the inescapable love of God. The best part about these saints of Zion is that they bring their doubts and uncertainties right up front. They are not afraid to put their questions on the table in front of God and everybody and challenge us to answer.

I grieve along with them as they struggle. I know something about that kind of pain when one must come to terms with the misinformation misery caused by well-meaning Church structures. For many, the damage is real, it is deep, and it has created an enormous roadblock in their search for ultimate Truths. I pray for the healing of their pain, and I rejoice to watch their journey; rejoice because I am confident that the loving Jesus who invites us to follow him will not abandon us until we have reached our goal.



My favorite searchers reject the simplistic answers, insisting on deeper truths. So it would be foolish of me to offer trite answers to profound questions, but here is an image that helps me think about the larger questions.

Jesus makes reference to God's Holy Spirit as like 'living water.' If the goal of religion is to bathe people in living water, then the Church is the water pipe. The water pipe's job is to deliver the water reliably, adding as little contamination as possible. Religion is the delivery system; what is important is the living water it delivers.

Some of us have been injured by contamination from the pipe while we have been in search of the water that cleanses and refreshes us. Even so, I am confident that the refreshing stream of living water from God will overcome any contamination the Church has added. It is an honor to walk beside all of Zion's people as they seek the living water that restores us. To all of you who so boldly bring your doubts and questions, I say 'thank you.' Your honest searching is invaluable to us all.

You want the most Bang for your Buck.

When you make your donations to charitable causes, you want to feel confident that you are having the best impact. Some charities do a better job than others about making sure that your donation actually benefits the people you intend. Some charities do not. For example, it has been widely reported that Goodwill Industries pays its CEO \$2.3 Million dollars a year, and that eight cents of your dollar actually reaches needy patrons. Red Cross pays its CEO \$562,364. Heifer Project pays its CEO \$313,008 annually.

Some charities spend almost all the funds donated to raise more funds. Heifer Project spends 20% of its budget on fundraising, 8.7% on administrative costs.

September 2015: We are One Family

Every ethnic group in heaven or on earth is recognized by God. Ephesians 3: 15

Here at the YWCA of Palestine, we are celebrating the completion of our report on the international conference on Women's Freedom, Peace, and Dignity in Palestine. The conference was attended by people from all around the world who are working on issues related to women and violence and women's leadership. A number of staff and board members from Global Ministries as well as the Executive Minister of the UCC's Justice and Witness Ministries attended this historic conference and helped contribute to its success.

I am also working on our new electronic newsletter that is a compilation of news stories about how the occupation is affecting women's lives, and how women are standing up for their rights under patriarchy. I am continuously exploring new ways to tell our story and call for advocacy. Some stories never make the news, but quietly happen every day. This is one of my experiences:

Walking down the Via Dolorosa (the Way of Sorrows) in Jerusalem just before Station of the Cross #8, I stopped to buy three little Hebron pottery bowls to replace the ones the cats and I broke. After paying my Muslim friend the shopkeeper, I was asked if I would do him a favor. I said of course. He wrote down the name of a Christian man and asked that I pray for him. He said he was a friend of the family and that this man was very sick. They had already gone to the Holy Sepulcher and lit a candle. Could I do the same at St. Andrews?

This circle of love by Muslims praying for Christians doesn't make it into the news but it happens all the time, naturally. We are of one family not just Christ's body.
