

"The Sun Always Shines"

Yogi Berra said, "You can observe a lot just by watching." My favorite philosopher! He is so often exactly correct. You can observe a lot just by watching. On an airline trip a while back, I observed a profound and striking truth just by watching. Maybe an attitude of openness was as important as the event in teaching me a truth that had escaped me before then.

Our takeoff had been delayed by over an hour due to a thunderstorm. Some of the passengers showed their annoyance and frustration. A few made themselves an annoyance to the harried boarding crew at the gate; as if they should have done something to make the storm go away. More than a few wore nervous expressions, worried about what might happen if the plane got itself caught up in the storm. None of us on that flight were interested in going to Oz that day.

Finally, the storm abated some and we were allowed to board the airplane. The skies were still dark and threatening as we took off through a driving rain. Seconds after the wheels left the runway, we disappeared into the clouds where we were bumped and jostled by the turbulence of the storm.

At times the clouds were so thick we could not even see the tips of the wings. As we reached our cruising altitude, we broke through the storm. Our view from above the storm was thrilling and powerful. This rolling carpet of clouds stretched below us, ranging from white to grey to almost black. It moved and changed, churning and heaving. At times the clouds were lit by lightning strikes beneath us, inside the storm.

The space where we were flying was clear and bright, the sun shone with its full intensity, lighting a sky above us an intense, peaceful blue.

That's when I observed a powerful, incredible truth: No matter what the weather is like on the ground, the sun is always shining. Sometimes there are storms between us and the sun, but that does not change the sun. Just because we can't always see the sun doesn't mean it is not always there.

There are other kinds of storms in our lives. Sometimes they bring real pain and threats to our inner peace. But no matter how dark the storm, no matter how terrifying the events of our day, God is still present. Sometimes we may not be aware of God's presence because our attention has been focused on the immediate events, but God is still just as near as ever, just as powerful as always.

No matter how bad the storm, the sun still shines, even when we cannot see it. God's presence in our lives is the same.

October 2 Monotheism: Belief in One God October 9 Concord and Conflict in Theology




ZION IN TOP 50

13 Homes Were Selected.

10 homeowners live alone. Two are males, including one veteran, and 8 are females.

- 1 homeowner has a disabled adult daughter living with her.
- 2 homeowners have children.
- 2 homeowners are under the age of 55 and are single parents with two children each.
- 5 homeowners are between the ages of 58-65.
- 6 homeowners are between the ages of 66-88.

The average income of the homeowners is \$1,340 per month.

Three homeowners have income below \$900 per month, with one of their incomes being \$585 per month.

It was for all of them a labor of love: love for Glen and Debbie, and love for this space that makes worship so special here at Zion.

September Is National Preparedness Month

Zion Church is passionate about loving neighbor as if they were our own kin. In September, we participate in Paint-a-Thon, painting and freshening up the home of one of our neighbors. We share our material resources with others through Bridging the Gap, helping with rent, food, utilities, etc. and we respond to the larger church when disasters strike.

At Zion, one of the ways we express our faith is by responding to disasters. Because September is National Preparedness Month, it is a good time for us to think about how we prepare to help in the event of a disaster in Burlington.

Each September, Americans are encouraged to make sure they are prepared for disasters or emergencies in their homes, businesses and communities. Iowans are urged to take the necessary steps to be prepared for all emergencies and disasters

- both natural and man-made.

Being Prepared Means:

Families and individuals have an emergency supply kit so they can be self-reliant

for at least three days in an emergency and they have a plan for how they will respond and reconnect with other family members after an emergency.

Zion Church will be developing a plan for how we will work together in the event of a disaster, look after our members, utilize our facility for the benefit of the whole community, and back up critical information.

Disasters and emergencies of all kinds can strike anywhere at any time. Investing in the preparedness of ourselves, our families, and our Church will reduce suffering and enhance our ability to respond to our neighbors in a time of need.

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September 2016: Loving Our Neighbor

Mark 12:31

It's not every day that the Consul General of a Middle Eastern country asks to come for a visit to the Hong Kong Christian Council (HKCC). When the Consul General arrived with his staff, he explained that he was new to his position and was troubled by events around the world involving violence and terrorism. He was concerned about the rise of 'Islamophobia' or anti-Muslim sentiment. He wanted to reach out to other religions in Hong Kong to get to know them and to build better relationships. In our conversation, he learned that the HKCC also actively seeks ways to build friendship and engage in dialogue with other world religions.

At one point, the Consul General asked us how Christians viewed what was happening in the world where more and more violent conflicts were breaking out between cultures and religions. I thought for a moment. And the words of a Syrian Christian I had heard just a few days earlier came to mind: "Christians always stand for non-violence and non-retaliation. We must always forgive. We are taught by Jesus in the bible to love our enemies." And that's what I told him. I couldn't think of anything else that is more central to our Christian faith than loving God, loving our neighbor and loving our enemy.

The Consul General didn't know us and we didn't know him. But he came in search of peace and a sign of friendship among people of faith. I wonder what would happen if local churches and Christians took more initiative to reach out to get to know people of other faiths. We often speak of "extending the right hand of fellowship" to our Christian brothers and sisters in worship. Perhaps we could find more opportunities to shake hands with those in our own cities that come from other lands and cultures and faiths. Like us, they desire nothing more than living together in peace and friendship.
