

"God Invites Us To Grow"

Moving to Seventh Grade was a terrifying, completely unknown process. 7th graders were in a different school building. Students changed classrooms and had different teachers for every class.

It was terribly stressful.

- "What if I forget where I'm supposed to go for my next class?"
- "What will I do with my books?"
- · "What if none of the teachers knows my name?"
- "Where is the cafeteria?"

Change does not come without fear. But it is necessary to face the unfamiliar. What would happen to a child so intimidated by the thought of entering a new school for 7th grade that he refused to go; insisted on staying in 6th grade forever? At first, the familiarity would be comforting. He would know all the teachers; would be confident he knew where his locker was; where the lunchroom was, where he would spend all his day. After a while though, comfortable familiarity would become a smothering trap. If he stays in elementary school forever, he can never reach full maturity in his education.

Change is always stressful. Leaving behind the familiar is a frightening prospect. But the only way we grow is to leave behind what is known and take on the new and unknown. Leaving behind the familiar to journey into new territories is as frightening for adults as it is for school children leaving the comfort and familiarity of elementary school for the unknown of 7th grade. But the alternative to change is stagnation.

The alternative to change is not keeping the status quo. The alternative to change is stagnation.

God does not invite us to maintain the status quo. God invites us to grow. Every time we open ourselves to grow in our faith, God responds by transforming our lives in ways we could never expect; giving us blessings and graces we could never anticipate.

Our task as individuals is to open ourselves to that transformation.

Our tasks as a congregation include making an appropriately fertile space for transformation to occur. Farmers don't make the corn grow. Farmers tend the soil to make an appropriate space so that God can make the corn grow best. As a congregation, part of our role is to prepare a good soil bed so that the seeds of faith can grow best.

 - Oleading worship,

 - Oplaying piano, organ, and other musical instruments
 - Operforming, writing, or finding scripts for skits, puppets, etc.
 - OAdorning the Sanctuary to make a worshipful space
 - Ofeeding the hungry, (Social Justice Comm.)
- Mission Trips; in town, (Paint-a-Thon), to Detroit, maybe even to other countries


Cemetery Scavenger Hunt

Zion has a long and proud history of supporting the ministry of CROP/Hunger Walk and Church World Service. Last year, 17 Burlington churches participated in the CROP Walk, bringing 88 walkers, contributing over \$10,000. Zion accounted for 15% of that total, the most of any church. We sent 10 walkers, surpassed only by First UMC, who fielded one walker more than we. **Nancy Schulte** raised the most of any Zionista, 3rd most of any individual. Way to go, Nancy! What if Zion tried for a dozen walkers this year? We are not the largest church in town, but we may have the biggest heart for the ministry. That is one of the things that makes your pastor so proud to be here! Thank you for your extravagant generosity! -Pastor Brice

Where Do Crop Hunger Walk Funds Go?

CROP Hunger Walks help to provide food and water, as well as resources that empower people to meet their own needs. From seeds and tools, to wells and water systems, to technical training and micro-enterprise loans, the key is people working together to identify their own development priorities, their strengths and their needs something CWS has learned through some 70 years of working in partnership around the world.

CROP Hunger Walk Background:

With its inception in 1969, CROP Hunger Walks are "viewed by many as the granddaddy of charity walks," notes the Los Angeles Times (Oct. 26, 2009).

On October 17, 1969, a thousand people in Bismarck, ND, walked in what may have been the start of the hunger walks related to CROP – and raised \$25,000 to help stop hunger. As far as we know, York County, Penn., was the first walk officially called the CROP Walk for the Hungry – and that event has been continuous since 1970.

Several other CROP Hunger Walks occurred soon thereafter, and before long there were hundreds of Walks each year in communities nationwide.

Currently, well over 2,000 communities across the U.S. join in more than 1,300 CROP Hunger Walks each year. More than five million CROP Hunger Walkers have participated in more than 36,000 CROP Hunger Walks in the last two decades alone.

Zion will not have a morning worship service on Christmas Day.



The store is a major source of income for this well respected, nonprofit organization that provides vocational, residential, community employment and living services for over 530 mentally and physically challenged persons in Southeast Iowa. Bursting at the seams at their previous location, Hope Haven decided to keep a downtown location. Even better, they worked with architects from Klingner & Associates to design an infill building on a City-Owned empty lot that would fit the site of the Downtown Commercial Historic District. 


Now the building has been reborn, and downtown has its first brewpub.
